"History Now" Project

Due December 8, 2010

This packet was designed by a student in HI 113 (US History Since 1945) in the spring of 2010.

The original assignment asked students to choose one significant event in American history since 1980 (and also to consider what defines an "event" in the first place). Based on that event, they assembled a packet of 3-5 sources, and wrote an introductory essay to explain their chosen sources. Some of the packets also include a "writing prompt" for the future user, i.e. a suggested question which the documents might be able to help answer.

Your "History Now" assignment has three parts:

- 1) **critique** and **assess** the existing packet according to the attached worksheet
- 2) **write** a 2-3 page essay based on the packet's writing prompt, **using evidence** from the documents. If there's no prompt, write one and then answer it using specific evidence from the packet.
- 3) add one new source to the packet, and explain why you chose it

Submit all 3 parts of your assignment in a folder, page protector sleeve or envelope – something self-contained.

Due in class on Wednesday, December 8.

If you choose, you can submit it early by putting in my mailbox (Sullivan 327-B). No electronic submissions, and no late work. I will not accept the project, in any form, after class ends on December 8th.
