# **Testing Your Thesis**

If	Then
Your proposed thesis does no more than	$\rightarrow$ It is <i>not</i> a thesis
repeat the topic you are writing about	
Your proposed thesis poses a question	→ It is <i>not</i> a thesis
without suggesting an answer	
Your proposed thesis merely articulates	→ It is <i>not</i> a thesis
a fact or series of facts	
Your proposed thesis simply reflects a	→ It is <i>not</i> a thesis
personal belief or preference	

### **BUT**

If	Then
Your proposed thesis:	
suggests an answer to a question you	
have posed as a result of your reading	
and	_
it is specific rather than general and	→ It is a thesis
it is debatable (that is, it asserts a	
conclusion with which a reader might	
disagree), and	
can be supported by evidence from the	
sources

- ✓ Describes both sources
- ✓ Answers the question or supports the thesis using evidence from the sources
- ✓ Concludes by summarizing your argument and how the chosen documents support your thesis

- ✓ Title
- ✓ At least 5 pages in length
- ✓ Page numbers
- ✓ Correct Chicago-Style footnotes
- ✓ 2 primary source documents
- ✓ A thesis that meets the checklist criteria on the back of this sheet

#### Did you do this before printing?

- ✓ Read the paper out loud
- ✓ Add page numbers
- ✓ Run spell-check
