Possible Essay Questions

What were the competing visions and strategies for Reconstruction? What parts of Reconstructions were resolved, and what was left unresolved, in the American South by 1900?

The Gilded Age is often described as one of "laissez-faire" government approach to business and the economy. Is that accurate? What was the relationship of the federal government to industry and the national economy between 1865 and 1900?

Describe the importance of the Western region to cultural, economic and political developments in the rest of the nation between 1865-1900. Keep in mind that the West (despite our persistent myths) was a very multicultural place, and actually had higher percentages of foreign-born Americans than other parts of the nation.

Explain the arguments for and against American imperialism around the turn of the 20th century. Whose ideas and interests can you identify in the debate?

Discuss several different Progressive movements. How did these movements exemplify both democratic and anti-democratic goals? How "progressive" was the Progressive Era?
